Respect Life

"To kill one human being for the benefit of another is never morally justifiable", said Patricia Payne, a woman suffering from Parkinson's for 14 years, adding "to kill the weak in order to benefit the strong is even more objectionable." Ms. Payne recently testified before the Massachusetts Legislature's newly created Joint Committee on Economic Development and Emerging Technologies. She has been selected as one of a dozen participants in Dr. Michel Levesque's adult stem-cell research and therapy program to treat Parkinson's.

According to Fr. Tadeusz Pacholczyk (Father Tad), who studied neuroscience at Yale University and theology at Gregorian University in Rome, the Catholic Church supports three of the four ways that stem-cell research is currently being conducted. They are: >Adult stem-cell research, involving the growth of stem cells from the patient's own tissue or that of another living donor. >Stem cells developed from umbilical cord blood or placentas after a delivery is completed. >Cells from fetal tissue derived from miscarriages (also called spontaneous abortions), as long as the parents give informed consent.

The morally unacceptable fourth method is the use of embryonic stem cells, usually harvested from living embryos five to seven days after their creation in a test tube.

Young Adult Ministry refers to people in their late teens, twenties, and early thirties, whether single, married, or divorced. It provides them opportunities through programs and resources to explore ways of integrating faith into their lives. Young Adult Ministry develops leadership that will awaken, empower, and strengthen others

in their journey of faith. This past summer a group of 24 culturally diverse young adults from our diocese participated in a weeklong service project in the Hartford, Connecticut area working as a community of faith. They served at various settings, including a shelter for battered women, a half-way house for the mentally challenged, and Catholic Charities Immigration Services. This year a group of young adults is planning a similar experience at various sites on Long Island.


