

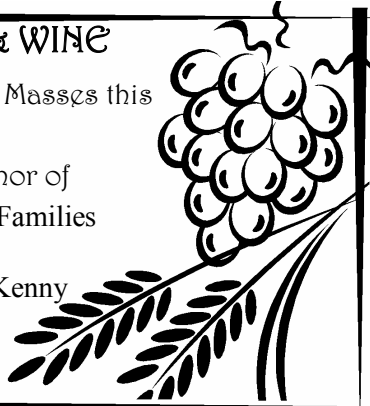
OUR LITURGY

FROM THE DESK OF FR. MIKE bulletin,

The Parables have now ended, and in this week's Gospel account, we are taken through many different emotions. The account begins with Jesus hearing about the death of John the Baptist, and how Jesus becomes noticeably upset. Jesus goes away from the crowd to be alone, and to deal with the grief of His cousin's death. Yet the crowd does not leave Him alone, so desperate are they to be held tight by Jesus. Jesus, even though He is filled with personal sorrow, cannot turn His back on them. No, He preaches to them, cures them, and spends the whole day with them. As evening draws on, the Apostles want Jesus to send the crowd away, but Jesus will not hear of it! Rather He tells the Apostles to give them something, but all they have is **5 loaves and 2 fish-how can that feed so many?**

Of course, we know the rest of the story, and this wonderful feeding miracle is found in all **4 Gospel Accounts**. This miracle is the foreshadowing of the greater miracle, which is the Eucharist. In fact, so powerful is this foreshadowing, that John does not include Jesus' words of institution in his account of the Last Supper because this miracle points directly to the Eucharist. In this account, we see that Jesus moves beyond teaching the people, He is now feeding them- *1st physically* with the loaves and fish, *then spiritually* with His Body and Blood. This passage does the same for us today, as every Sunday we are fed with the Word of God and by Jesus' Body and Blood. Both give us what we need so we can be strengthened, refreshed, converted, and empowered. During the past few weeks, Jesus has been teaching us and telling us how we should avoid sin, work for the Kingdom and let God's word grow in our hearts. So, now He takes us to the next step and feeds us not with bread and fish, but with Himself in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass-in Body and Blood. Thank you, Jesus for giving us everything we need to change our lives and be truly enriched by you. Thank you, for feeding us in spirit, mind, and body and leading us always to yourself and the Father.

Thank you, also to all who volunteered at the **Summer Family Festival**. We all had a great time especially knowing that we were working hard for the good of the parish. We could not do it without you. Remember to thank our sponsors and those who provided goods and services, by patronizing their businesses. Besides the businesses listed in this

several individuals also contributed money to support the festival they too should be thanked. Thanks to: *Barbara Mickelson and Evelyn Batt, St. Joseph's CYO, and Rev. Francis S. Midura* our former pastor and pastor of St. Thomas More Church. As soon as we have the results of the Festival, we will let you know!

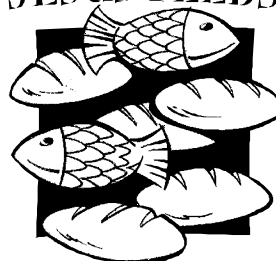

Religious Education

The Religious Ed Office is closed for the summer we will reopen on August 22nd.

Since our office is closed during the summer months we would like to take this opportunity to welcome the new families who will be moving into our parish and inform you about our Religious Education program. Each week we will give you a heads up on the different levels of our Program. Some families do not realize that we have continuing education. After receiving Reconciliation and First Eucharist, we start educating our students as follows:

Level Three In this level, the children will be introduced to the Bible and the Catholic Church. They will experience belonging and being part of a community. Level 3 children will be given a church tour and participate in the living rosary. Level 3 will also have an opportunity to receive the sacrament of reconciliation.

Level Four In this level we explore what it means to live as a follower of Jesus within the Catholic church. We will discover how our learning to live according to God's laws (Beatitudes and Ten Commandments) can make a difference in the world. Level 4 will also have an opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and participate in the Living Rosary.

Level 5 Our curriculum for Level five concentrates on the sacraments of the Church. We will learn how the Church continues the work of Jesus in the celebration of the Sacraments and how we, as individuals, can live sacraments lives by welcoming, forgiving and serving others we will spend a number of weeks on the parts of the liturgy ad the celebration of Eucharist. The students

will also participate in the Living Rosary. The students will also have an opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

RESPECT LIFE

Thirty years ago this summer, some of us saw a movie that so frightened us, we didn't dare to swim in the ocean for quite a while. That movie was "Jaws", of course.

The reason for mentioning this is that one of the principal characters is now in another struggle, a personal one. Roy Scheider is battling multiple myeloma, a cancer of the plasma cells. In June of this year, he had a bone marrow transplant, and as he says, "I was my own donor. They (doctors at Memorial Sloan Kettering) harvested my stem cells, and it went well." The Multiple Myeloma Research Foundation said the disease is incurable but treatable, and that 50,000 Americans are living with this condition. The point here is that the patient is also the donor – one more example proving that stem cell transplantation (not embryonic stem cells) has been shown to destroy myeloma cells.

Here's one more example of this: A report on a particular heart surgery is set to appear in the Journal of Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery; in the new treatment, surgeons made mesh-like models of the tubes and patches needed, and during surgery, put them in place inside the patients. At the same time stem cells were taken from the bone marrow of the patients and then sprinkled onto the mesh, like seeds onto a flowerbed.

Over several months, the cells grew into the shape of the mesh, providing new arteries and covering holes in the heart.

The heart problems the patients suffered would otherwise be treated with artificial implants that may need to be replaced, especially in children, as they grow. Surgeons say the stem cell technique has great potential for adults as well as children.
