


FROM THE DESK OF FR. MIKE

Today's Gospel Reading tells us about another great miracle-Jesus Walking on the Water. While the story of the Loaves and the Fish, which we saw last week, appears in all 4 Gospels the Walking on the Water does not appear in Luke's Gospel. This is unusual because we see it in Matthew's, Mark's and even in John's Gospel-which usually tells us of different accounts not found in the Synoptic Gospels.

After the great miracle of the Multiplication of the Loaves and the Fish, Jesus dismisses the crowd and His Disciples and He wants to be alone so He can pray. He is in prayer for a long period, and why He goes off to pray is anybody's guess.

Perhaps after carrying out the miracle Jesus needs to recharge His spiritual battery. Perhaps Jesus is seeking the consolation of the Father and The Holy Spirit, after this great display of Divine Power and a sign of the coming of the Kingdom. And perhaps it is because of what we are told in Mark's Gospel (6:51-52) "*And he got into the boat with them and the wind ceased and they were utterly astounded, for they did not understand about the loaves, but their hearts were hardened.*" And we should take into account what we see in John's Gospel, where Jesus fled because they were about to make Him king, and the Apostles were going right along with the crowd because they did not understand. So Jesus sends them away and He goes off to pray so He can work things out and be renewed in His Holy Mission. After prayer, Jesus makes His way to the Lake (The Sea of Galilee) and sees the Apostles are in trouble. So, Jesus goes to them to help by walking across the sea. Here perhaps, is another attempt of the *Divine Messiah* to show the Apostles who He really is and that He did not come to be a political King but the one to lead us all to eternal life and God's Kingdom.

So, He goes to the Apostles' aid, and they think He is a ghost, and they are afraid until Jesus calls out to them and tells them to have courage. But Peter to test Jesus, tells Jesus to command him to likewise walk on the water. Well to his surprise, Peter walks over to Jesus, but when he looks down Peter starts to sink and cry out for Jesus' help. Jesus and Peter are able to do the impossible, for nothing is impossible for God, and if Peter truly understood this, he would not have given into fear. If Peter did not doubt, he would have been able to make it all the way to Jesus.



Matthew's ending is different from Mark's seen above, by having Peter learn from his mistake and declare whom Jesus is-The Son of God!

For us this story has great significance, for we can see that Jesus is always ready to help us when we are in trouble, when the sea we are on is getting rough. Jesus will walk even on the water to help us. But we must not be like Peter and lose faith in Jesus. When Peter took his eyes off Jesus, and looked down at the troubled waters (when we focus only on our troubles) he began to sink for he lost his faith.

Remember tomorrow August 8th, from 3:30-9 PM is our **Annual Parish Blood Drive** in Carew Hall. Please help by giving the gift of life. During the summer months blood supplies are usually low and donors are really needed. Please help!

Next Monday August 15th, is the Solemnity of the Assumption of The Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven Body and Soul. Since this Feast occurs on a Monday this year, it is not a Holy Day of Obligation. However, we will celebrate this great day with our usual 7 and 9 AM Masses as well as an Evening Mass at 7:30 PM-that Monday Night. *Our Rosary on the Lawn will be start at 7 PM and then we will move into the Church for the 7:30*

Mass, and that will be followed by fellowship.

As we mentioned in last week's bulletin, we received our first rebate check from the **Catholic Ministries Appeal**. We are happy to announce that we received the first installment of **\$1,842.40**, and more will come back to us when more pledges are paid off. There is still time to make a pledge for this worthwhile appeal and not only help our neighbors throughout the Diocese, but also our beloved parish. Thanks, to all who made this rebate possible. We close with some faith sharing questions: How have I felt God's presence in my life? How have I felt His presence at a time or place I didn't expect? Jesus tells us not to be afraid. What am I afraid of? How might I ask Jesus to help me deal with this fear?

Religious Education

The Religious Ed Office is closed for the summer we will reopen on August 22nd.

Since our office is closed during the summer months we would like to take this opportunity to welcome the new families who will be moving into our parish and inform you about our Religious Education program. Each week we will give you a heads up on the different levels of our Program. With the following levels we start to prepare our students for Confirmation. It is important that they learn how to use the Bible and understand the first part of the Mass which is the Liturgy of the Word.

Level Six The students will become adept at using the Bible. We will study Judeo-Christian Biblical history and learn to understand the relationship between God and God's people in the Old Testament. Students will be responsible for a report on one of these relationships. The students will be presented with a Bible. We hope to visit Temple Beth Chai in Hauppauge again this year. A Seder service is planned during Lent. Attending Sunday liturgies, competing the assigned Liturgy Response forms is a necessary part of this level. Level 6 will also participate in the Living Rosary. The students will also have the opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Level Seven The students in this level will use the Sunday readings to grow in knowledge and understanding of who Jesus was and is. Through the New Testament readings they will learn about the God of Jesus of Nazareth who calls us all to be disciples. Students will be required to do a Saint Report, attend Sunday Liturgies and complete weekly response forms. Level 7 will take part in the Living Rosary and have an opportunity to receive

the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

RESPECT LIFE

According to an article in Newsday, July 20, 2005, abortions in the United States continue to decline; still the numbers are awful.

Should we be grateful that in the year 2002, women in the U.S. had 1.29 MILLION abortions, down from 1.61 MILLION in 1990?

Scientists say it is difficult to determine why the number of abortions has been dropping. "There are so many things feeding into the decline", said Lawrence Finer, associate director of domestic research at the Alan Guttmacher Institute, which conducted the study. Possible factors, he said, include changes in contraceptive technologies and use, changing ideas about family size and abortion, and reduced access to abortion services. Pregnancy clinics and abstinence programs may also have contributed to the decline.

We second the premise that changing ideas about abortion, and the existence of abstinence programs have finally borne some fruit. More and more people are realizing that there are alternatives to abortion, and many helping hands are available. Help is a phone call away. Information about the pre-born baby, detailing his growth in the womb helps to make us aware that it IS a baby from the time of conception, and not just a blob of tissue. "Human life is a gift from God and as Catholics we have a most grave obligation to defend all human life from the moment of conception until natural death. God help us if we fail in this most fundamental obligation."

DID YOU KNOW?

You didn't tell anyone you were pregnant – you felt you couldn't let anyone know. You CAN protect your secret and get help, if your newborn baby is received unharmed. Call the helpline at 1-877-796-HOPE (4673).

Newborn babies can be brought to a Safe Haven (the local hospital's emergency department or any community firehouse) and you will not be prosecuted for abandonment. Total secrecy is assured and the police will not investigate. No information is required; however, for your baby's benefit, you may offer information about your family's medical history. Safe Havens are sponsored by the Children of Hope Foundation




