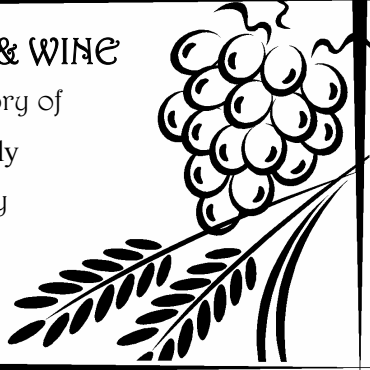

FROM THE DESK OF FR. MIKE

Today's parable from Matthew's Gospel, dealing with Christ's Second Coming, gives us a plan to follow to achieve salvation. But notice to whom and how salvation is offered! Salvation is offered to those who in their everyday life see Christ in others-especially those in need. Salvation is not offered as something that is unattainable (that is something that can only be achieved by those who practice some type of heroic spirituality or some other great act), but is offered to all who follow the teachings and examples given in the Gospel. All who feed the hungry, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, etc will see salvation and be with Christ on the Last Day! Of course, how we see and minister to Christ in others is not just limited to the examples given in this parable, but they are the primary categories in which we can minister to one another.

Jesus challenges us to move beyond our own personal comfort and fears and to do our part in making a difference in this world. We are called to realize that the practice of our faith is more than just to get us into heaven. Our faith calls us to be totally active in changing the world and to make the KINGDOM OF GOD PRESENT, IN THE HERE AND NOW! While it is true that the Kingdom can never be totally realized in this life, and will not be fully established until Christ comes again at the last judgment, it is also true that Christ announced that the Kingdom of God is here (as we see in the 3rd *Luminous Mystery of the Rosary-The Proclamation of the Kingdom*). This aspect of building the Kingdom here and now, while still looking for its final coming, is what this last Sunday of the Liturgical Year is all about, and it serves as a reminder as to what we should be working for in the new Liturgical Year.

While we may not celebrate **Christ the King** for the exact same reasons why *Pope Pius XI* added this Feast to the Church's Calendar, there are still good reasons for us to celebrate this great day. We must celebrate it because the world needs Christ-the Father's great gift to us-as an antidote to the secularism and a life, which leaves God out of humanity's thinking, so that many would say that God does not exist. If ever, the world needs Jesus, it needs Him now. Please pray for the world, for the peace of the world. The peace that only Christ can give; the very peace we will celebrate a month from now at Christmas.

Don't forget this coming Saturday is the *Backwards Raffle Drawing*, and at this writing, there are still

On Sunday December 11th at 2:30 PM in the Church, we will celebrate *Lessons and Carols-a traditional Advent Prayer Service*.

Thursday December 8th is the **Solemnity of The Immaculate Conception of The Blessed Virgin Mary**, and it is a holy day of obligation. The Masses are Weds. Night at 7:30 PM, Thurs. 7 AM, 9 AM, 12:10 PM, 5 PM and 7:30 PM. Following the 7:30 PM, Mass we will observe a Holy Hour for Life with Prayers, Readings, Adoration and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

We close with the following questions. Think of the week just past. In how many persons and circumstances might the Lord have come to you? As we prepare to begin Advent, how can you be more alert, more awake to the Lord's comings? How might we do this as a parish community?

RESPECT LIFE

“Say it isn’t so”...but according to Life News, November 2005, these things really are happening

- September 17, 2005; Zenit News Agency website (www.zenit.org) published an article entitled “Babies – Bought, Sold and Traded-A Dark Side of the Consumer Mind Set” states that “unborn children are increasingly being treated like consumer products, if recent news stories are an indication.”
- For example: from the *London Times*, a story that the National Academy of Sciences of the Ukraine sells baby parts. Its website contains a list of available cells and tissues, which, they claim, come from fetuses aborted at an early stage.
- The *British Observer* reports that Ukrainian women were being paid to sell their fetuses to clinics; the tissues are then used for beauty treatments that claim to rejuvenate skin and cure diseases (of adults.)
- The *Canadian Medical Association* published an article warning that women are being encouraged to donate fresh, as opposed to ‘surplus’ frozen embryos left over from previous in-vitro fertilization treatments, to create stem cells. In addition, the authors of that article also stated that the rules were changed so that ‘fresh’ human embryos could be used for stem cell research.
- George Neumayr in the *American Spectator* reported that more than 80% of babies diagnosed with Down syndrome during prenatal testing are now aborted. The birth rate for babies diagnosed with spina bifida has also dropped, and this drop coincides with the rise of prenatal screening. He also referred to the increase of medical malpractice suits for doctors who do not warn mothers about their fetus’s defects. According to the publication *Medical Malpractice Law & Strategy*, “Court rulings across the country are showing that the increased use of genetic testing has substantially exposed physicians’ liability for failure to counsel patients about hereditary disorders.”

The *London Sunday Times* tells of a couple living in Indonesia and adopting a child there, as they were unable to conceive a baby of their own. However, some time later, they did have a child, and so returned to their native country without the adopted child, who they returned to the orphanage, as it was “consumer friendly with a return policy.”

These are the consequences of denying the dignity and sanctity of life at its very beginning – little by little we slide into such situations as these.

“The pricey manufacture of “custom kids” (by genetic enhancement) would in fact undermine the value and dignity of human life by reducing these children to customized products like cars or computers. Rather than surprise and appreciation for the uniqueness and mystery of each individual, custom made children would be judged by how they conform to preset specifications”. - Marilyn Coors, Ph.D., “Genetic Enhancement: Custom Kids and

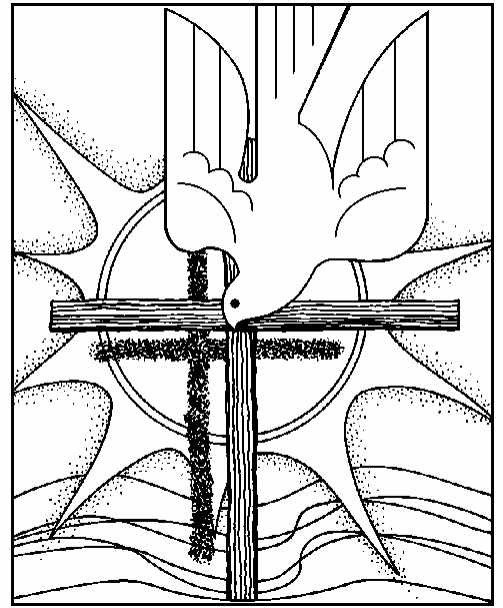

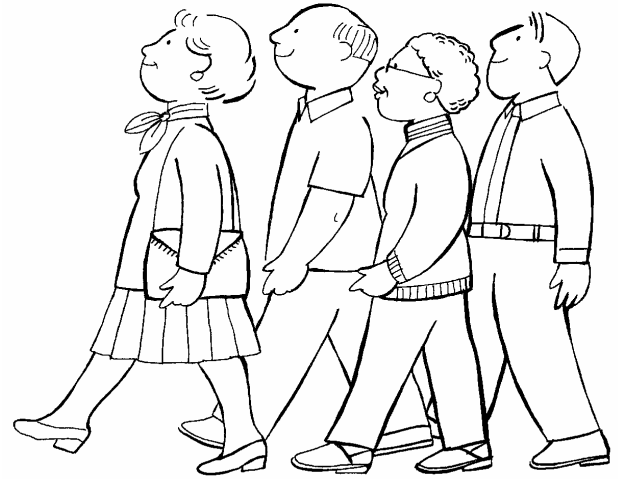

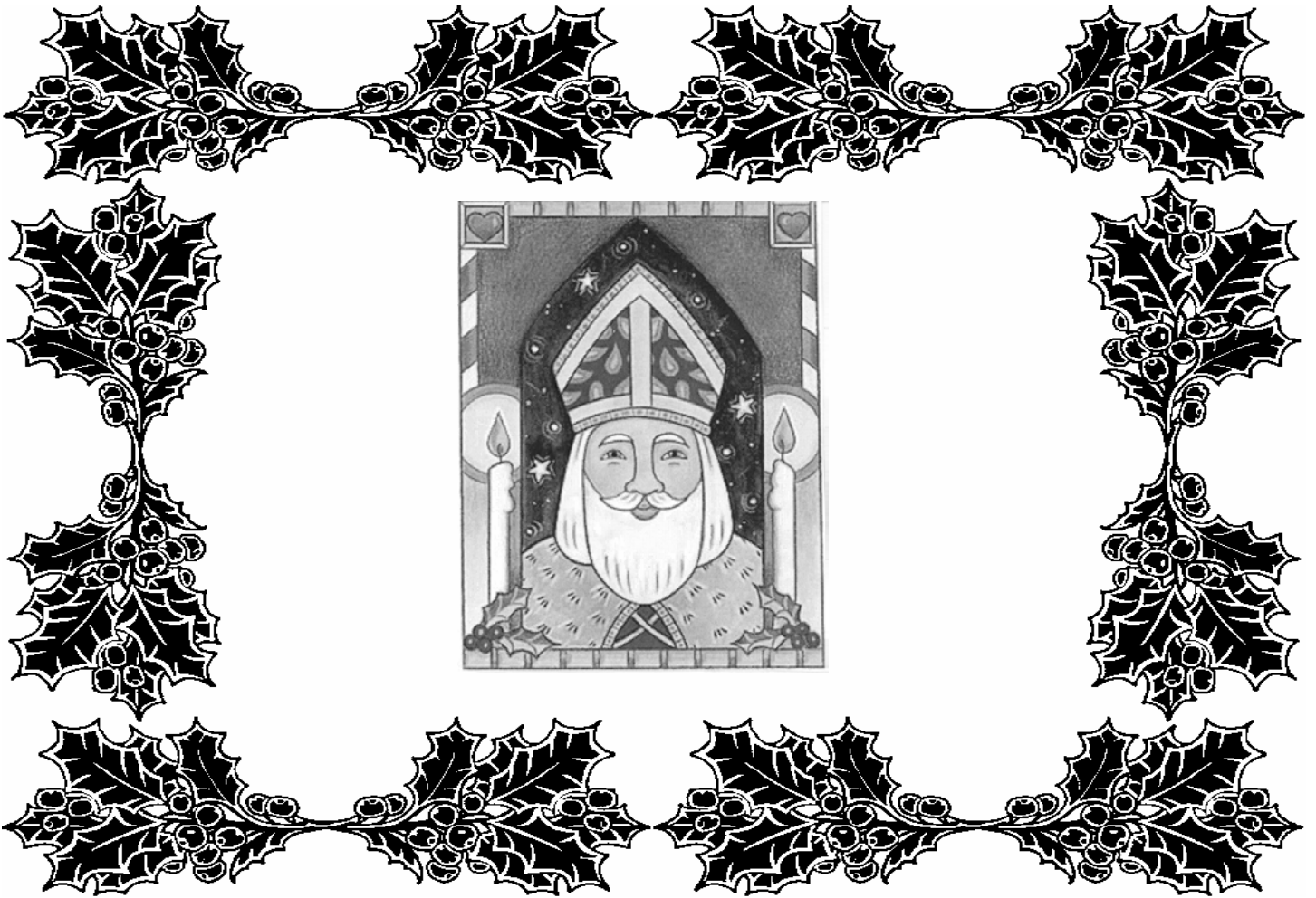

We will send them to a company who reuses them and gives the parish a bounty for each. One note, to clear confusion, if it is larger than a fist, it is not an inkjet cartridge!!!
