Looking For God's Healing Touch

Last weekend, I was approached right before the 9:00 mass by a parishioner who was to have a surgical procedure on Monday. She asked me if I could anoint her after the mass. After greeting people at the front door I walked back in to the church and saw something wonderful. She hadn't just asked me to pray with her and anoint her, she had asked her friends - her faith community to pray with her as well. There was about a dozen people gathered around her as we prayed. Their faith was palpable.

This is a great way to celebrate the anointing of the sick. Bringing your friends into the moment so that they can be the Body of Christ for you. *Is anyone among you sick? Then he must call for the elders of the church and they are to pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. (James 5:14)*. The people who gathered around this woman chose to be "The Elders" even though some of them were children. They chose to put their faith in action and it was beautiful to see. I had just preached about seeing signs of the presence of the fire of God's love in many ways in my life and right after mass I was given another one of those signs.

A little bit later I got a call on our emergency line just before the noon mass. It was a hospice nurse asking that I go anoint a man in hospice care. I explained to her that I was about to celebrate the noon mass and had Baptisms immediately following. I told her I would call the family right after Baptisms, which I did. When I spoke to the family I found out that the man had died a little bit after 12:00. I did some math and realized that, even if I were free to get right in my car, there was a good chance that he would have died before I got there.

I am not saying that this family did anything wrong - someone they love was dying and their emotions were probably bouncing them in many different directions like waves during a storm. They called out for help. It just turned out that the human side of the help could not be there on time. I am sure God was present with this man and his family and I am sure God responded to their cries for help in ways we may never be able to comprehend.

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is about healing of body, mind and spirit, through the prayers, the oil, the touch of the minister and the faith of the community gathered. Sometimes the Sacrament is a call for God's loving presence in the midst of the sickness and it truly does help with the healing process for the person. Sometimes the Sacrament is a sign of God's loving presence that will bring peace when death is imminent. God is always present in the celebration of this Sacrament.

The Sacrament is called Anointing of the Sick and it is about healing in one way or another. It is not called "Last Rites". This misnomer came into play during a time when frequent Confession was not part of the Church's practice. At one time in our history, Confession was a one time event and it was followed by a penitential lifestyle. People found this hard to do so they waited until they were about to die to confess their sins. At the same time they were anointed. When our rules regarding Sacramental Confession changed, people continued to ask for anointing at the very last minute which led to the use of the phrase "Extreme Unction" or last anointing. But the Sacrament of Anointing is not about dying and in the best case scenario, it should be celebrated as it was after the 9:00 mass last Sunday - with a community of faith and love gathered around the sick person.

I encourage everyone to pray for healing for all whose lives have been damaged by this scandal - the victims and their families, the accused, and the faithful who are trying to continue to walk close to Jesus in these very challenging times. If you have already been praying for this, please double down on your prayers for the healing of the church. God can do amazing things when we cooperate.

Later in the fall, we will have a healing mass celebrating the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. At this mass we will specifically be praying for healing for our church in addition to our prayers for anyone who is in need of healing in their lives.

Recently I have taken to fasting once or twice a week for the intention of healing in the church. Just a skipped meal, but giving it to God as a sign of solidarity with all who are suffering from this crisis and asking for God's healing touch. I invite everyone in our parish to think about joining in this or in any other penitential practice for the healing of the church. Let's continue to hold one another in our prayers.

Jesús es la puerta abierta

En el tiempo de Jesús, el rabinismo había creado sus teorías con respecto a quiénes se salvaban. Los liberales afirmaban que todo el pueblo judío se salvaría; los más radicales sostienen que solo los practicantes alcanzarían la salvación. Pero ambos entendían que la salvación pasaba por el asunto de la raza. Incluso hoy muchos piensan así, creen que, por pertenecer a una iglesia, ostentar determinados títulos o afiliarse a partidos barnizados del cristianismo es garantía de salvación.

Pero Jesús resuelve la cuestión narrando la parábola de la "puerta cerrada", donde hay personas que participan de un banquete, y otras que quieren entrar pero no pueden porque resultan tan extrañas para el dueño que no las reconoce. No obstante, hay cristianos que se consideran más amigos de Jesús y que tienen derechos adquiridos porque "comieron y bebieron" con él, y que, por lo tanto, tienen para sí la puerta abierta de la salvación. Pero Jesús niega cualquier privilegio al decir: "No sé de dónde son". Muchas veces, al igual que el rabinismo y el legalismo fariseo, hoy se piensa que, por el hecho de participar en retiros, movimientos cristianos o la catequesis, la puerta para entrar al banquete está abierta. Lástima que aún no se entienda que esos actos no son ninguna garantía, puesto que, **si no están acompañados por la práctica de la caridad o la justicia**, de nada sirven. Lo único que se ha sembrado con esa actitud es una falsa seguridad. La puerta se declara estrecha porque el "yo" y las "presunciones" del hombre no pasan por ella, sino que deben morir afuera. Sólo Jesús es la puerta, y puede quedar afuera incluso aquel que "está bien" y cree vivir en una presunta justicia. Nadie puede decir "yo no tengo pecado", como tampoco nadie se salva por los méritos propios. **¡Solo Dios salva!**

"Diary of an Unborn Child" From National Right To Life

Day 1: fertilization: all human chromosomes are present; unique human life begins.

Day 6: embryo begins implantation in the uterus.

Day 22: heart begins to beat with the child's own blood, often a different type than the mothers'.

Week 3: By the end of third week the child's backbone spinal column and nervous system are forming. The liver, kidneys and intestines begin to take shape.

Week 4: By the end of week four the child is ten thousand times larger than the fertilized egg.

Week 5: Eyes, legs, and hands begin to develop.

Week 6: Brain waves are detectable; mouth and lips are present; fingernails are forming.

Week 7: Eyelids, and toes form, nose distinct. The baby is kicking and swimming.

Week 8: Every organ is in place, bones begin to replace cartilage, and fingerprints begin to form. By the 8th week the baby can begin to hear.

Weeks 9 and 10: Teeth begin to form, fingernails develop. The baby can turn his head, frown, and hiccup.

Weeks 10 and 11: The baby can "breathe" amniotic fluid and urinate. Week 11 the baby can grasp objects placed in its hand; all organ systems are functioning. The baby has a skeletal structure, nerves, and circulation.

Week 12: The baby has all of the parts necessary to experience pain, including nerves, spinal cord, and thalamus. Vocal cords are complete. The baby can suck its thumb.

Week 14: At this age, the heart pumps several quarts of blood through the body every day.

Week 15: The baby has an adult's taste buds.

Month 4: Bone Marrow is now beginning to form. The heart is pumping 25 quarts of blood a day. By the end of month 4 the baby will be 8-10 inches in length and will weigh up to half a pound.

Week 17: The baby can have dream (REM) sleep.

Week 19: Babies can routinely be saved at 21 to 22 weeks after fertilization, and sometimes they can be saved even younger.

Week 20: At 20 weeks the baby recognizes its' mothers voice. At 20 weeks, the unborn child is capable of feeling pain. This is also the earliest at which partial-birth abortion is performed.

Months 5 and 6: The baby practices breathing by inhaling amniotic fluid into its developing lungs. The baby will grasp at the umbilical cord when it feels it. Most mothers feel an increase in movement, kicking, and hiccups from the baby. Oil and sweat glands are now functioning. The baby is now twelve inches long or more, and weighs up to one and a half pounds.

Months 7 through 9: Eyeteeth are present. The baby opens and closes his eyes. The baby is using four of the five senses (vision, hearing, taste, and touch.) He knows the difference between waking and sleeping, and can relate to the moods of the mother. The baby's skin begins to thicken, and a layer of fat is produced and stored beneath the skin. Antibodies are built up, and the baby's heart begins to pump 300 gallons of blood per day. Approximately one week before the birth the baby stops growing, and "drops" usually head down into the pelvic cavity.


