Respect Life



By <u>Calvin Freiburger</u> (excerpts from article reprinted from Live Action News)

Pro-lifers and honest pro-abortion legal scholars agree that *Roe v. Wade* was wrongly decided. But just how wrong is it? Is it bad law solely because it declares a right to something the Constitution is silent about, or does its judicial malpractice run deeper? The Stream reports that the "Harvard Journal of Law and Public Policy" has published an article written by Harvard law student (and former Live Action contributor) Josh Craddock that lays out the case in perhaps the most depth it's ever Article in Harvard Law Journal concludes: The preborn child is a constitutional person

received.

The first key point of Craddock's work, critiquing the late, great Justice Antonin Scalia from the right, is an audacious undertaking, but here it's warranted. You see, while Scalia was a committed originalist and clear opponent of *Roe*, he was also of the opinion that the Constitution is neutral toward abortion – that its use of the word "persons" "clearly means walking-around persons," and therefore, states should be left free to set whatever abortion laws they want. Craddock notes several other pro-life judicial originalists who hold (or held) this view, though Scalia is the most recent and most revered modernly.

Craddock concedes that there is some basis for this thinking because "natural rights were not exhaustively enshrined in the federal Constitution" and "states have traditionally decided the question of personhood." However, he rightfully maintains that a truly originalist answer to the question has to consider what the word "persons" was understood to mean when the Fourteenth Amendment was written and ratified.

He proceeds to explain that layman's dictionaries treated the concepts of humanity and personhood interchangeably, and so did legal terminology – more explicitly so, in fact. As we've discussed in the past, Craddock notes that Blackstone expressly recognized that personhood and the right to life existed before birth with a simple and clear legal standard: "where life can be shown to exist, legal personhood exists" (emphasis added). This also perfectly explains why it's irrelevant that past laws didn't protect the preborn prior to quickening.

Craddock next shows that many of the states that voted to ratify the Fourteenth Amendment had also criminalized abortion, meaning they understood personhood then in much the same way that pro-lifers understand it now:

From there, Craddock explains how the quickening standard was little more than a practical evidentiary standard, not a meaningful commentary on prenatal life (or lack thereof). But interestingly, he points out that even by the mid-nineteenth century, courts and states alike were increasingly rejecting it as scientifically obsolete, and replacing it with – surprise! – fertilization.

Next, and perhaps most importantly, Craddock examines the thinking of the Fourteenth Amendment's drafters. There's an understandable assumption that because the amendment's primary purpose was extending citizenship to freed blacks after the Civil War, its effects shouldn't be construed to extend beyond that purpose. But under the originalist principle of authorial intent, the first word is often the last word in resolving such confusion:

In light of this evidence and reasoning (as well as rebuttals to possible objections I have skipped, but which you should take the time to read), Craddock concludes that there is only one proper constitutional approach to abortion: protection!

Respeta la vida

El artículo en Harvard Law Journal concluye: El niño no nacido es una persona constitucional Por Calvin Freiburger (extractos del artículo reimpreso de Live Action News)

Los estudiosos legales pro -vida y honestos pro-aborto están de acuerdo en que *Roe v. Wade* se decidió erróneamente . Pero, ¿qué tan equivocado es? ¿Es una ley mala únicamente porque declara el derecho a algo sobre lo que la Constitución no dice nada, o su negligencia judicial es más profunda? The Stream informa que el "Harvard Journal of Law and Public Policy" ha publicado un artículo escrito por el estudiante de derecho de Harvard (y antiguo colaborador de Live Action) Josh Craddock que expone el caso tal vez con la mayor profundidad que jamás haya recibido.

El primer punto clave del trabajo de Craddock, criticar *desde la derecha al* gran juez Antonin Scalia , es una empresa audaz, pero aquí está justificado. Verá, mientras Scalia era un originalista comprometido y un claro opositor de *Roe*, también opinaba que la Constitución es neutral con respecto al aborto , que su uso de la palabra "personas" "claramente significa caminar por las personas", y por lo tanto, los estados deberían ser libres de establecer las leyes de aborto que quieran. Craddock señala varios otros originalistas judiciales pro-vida que sostienen (o sostienen) este punto de vista, aunque Scalia es la más reciente y venerada en la actualidad.

Craddock admite que hay alguna base para este pensamiento porque "los derechos naturales no estaban consagrados exhaustivamente en la Constitución federal" y "los estados han decidido tradicionalmente la cuestión de la personalidad". Sin embargo, él sostiene con razón que una respuesta verdaderamente original a la pregunta tiene que considere lo que se entendió que significaba la palabra "personas" cuando se escribió y ratificó la Decimocuarta Enmienda.

Continúa explicando que los diccionarios legos trataban los conceptos de humanidad y personalidad de manera intercambiable, y también lo hizo la terminología legal, más explícitamente, de hecho. Como hemos discutido en el pasado, Craddock señala que Blackstone reconoció expresamente que la personalidad y el derecho a la vida existían antes del nacimiento con un estándar legal simple y claro: "donde *se puede demostrar* que la vida existe, existe la personalidad jurídica" (énfasis agregado) . Esto también explica perfectamente por qué es irrelevante que las leyes pasadas no protegieran al recién nacido antes de la aceleración.

A continuación, Craddock muestra que muchos de los estados que votaron para ratificar la Decimocuarta Enmienda también habían criminalizado el aborto, lo que significa que entendieron la personalidad de la misma manera que los pro-vida lo entienden ahora:

A partir de ahí, Craddock explica cómo el estándar de aceleración fue poco más que un estándar probatorio práctico, no un comentario significativo sobre la vida prenatal (o la falta del mismo). Pero curiosamente, señala que incluso a mediados del siglo XIX, los tribunales y los estados por igual lo rechazaban cada vez más por ser científicamente obsoleto, y lo reemplazaban por ... ¡sorpresa! - fertilización .

A continuación, y quizás lo más importante, Craddock examina el pensamiento de los redactores de la Decimocuarta Enmienda. Hay una suposición comprensible de que debido a que el propósito principal de la enmienda era extender la ciudadanía a los negros liberados después de la Guerra Civil, sus efectos no deberían interpretarse para extenderse más allá de ese propósito. Pero bajo el principio originalista de la intención de autor, la primera palabra es a menudo la última palabra para resolver tal confusión:

A la luz de esta evidencia y razonamiento (así como las refutaciones a posibles objeciones que he omitido, pero que debería tomarse el tiempo de leer), Craddock concluye que solo hay un enfoque constitucional apropiado para el aborto: ¡protección!
