In the first reading, Isaiah speaks of a day when the glory and splendor of God will be apparent to all. God will come to save. James encourages the community to be patient as they await Christ's return. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples of John the Baptist to go and tell John of miracles that have occurred. He then tells the crowd of John the Baptist's greatness.

Here Are Some Interesting Ways We Can Prepare The Way Of The Lord Right Here At St Joseph Parish

About two months ago a parishioner came up to me after mass asking if there is a way we can be more aware of meeting and serving Jesus in the elderly and handicapped in our community. She pointed out that there are often people at weekend masses who are driven here and picked up by a special bus. She them mentioned that at times it is difficult for the bus to get near the front of the church to pick them up. She made a suggestion and we followed up on it. Now we need some help from everyone:

We have a new, large sign that reserves a spot for the bus to pick up and drop of those who need assistance. We have decided the best place to put it is at one end of the parking area in front of the church. You may have noticed it near the driveway between the church and school. This gives handicapped people access to a ramp in front of the church and gives the bus an easy place to park (at the front of the line).

Now we really need the cooperation of everyone. Please do not park next to that driveway - leave about 1 1/2 spaces for the bus to park. Sometimes the sign blows down. We ask you to honor this space even when you don't see the sign.

When speaking to people about appropriate dress at mass, the rule of thumb is, if my mode of dress might be a distraction to someone (whether by being too provocative or too sloppy) then maybe I should change what I am wearing. It has been brought to my attention that at times, it is not the mode of dress that is distracting, but the amount of perfume or cologne that some parishioners are wearing. I have been told it is not only distracting, but sometimes it even makes it difficult to breathe.

The reality is, it is easy to become "nose blind". When this happens, we need more and more of our favorite scent in order to be able to smell it ourselves. Unfortunately, the more and more is what really becomes a challenge for some people at mass (some of whom have respiratory problems).

Can I please ask that we all think about this as we prepare for mass? Maybe hold off on the perfume or cologne until after mass for the sake of our brothers and sisters.

One last thing. We have spaces designated for handicapped people and our Ministers do the best they can to stop to give them Communion while they are on their way to their assigned station. Unless designated, the first row (without a kneeler) is the only handicapped row. If you are in the next row, it is expected that you will process to Communion like the rest of the community. The second row is not there to take the place of a Communion rail. Please keep the handicapped rows for those who need them and their families, and if you are able bodied, processing to Communion is expected and it is also a way of giving thanks to God for the gift of being able bodied. Thank you all for your cooperation in these simple matters:

- Leaving the parking space free for the handicapped bus
- Limiting the amount of cologne or perfume at mass
- Leaving the handicapped rows for those in need

Are all works of mercy. Whatever you do for the least of my brothers and sisters, you do for me (Mt 25:40).

Supreme Court allows Kentucky abortion ultrasound law to take effect by Kimberly Leonard

The Supreme Court won't hear an appeal over a Kentucky law that forces health providers to show pregnant women ultrasounds of their fetuses before having abortions.

The decision, issued Monday, means that the Supreme Court leaves intact a 2-1 ruling from the 6th Circuit that the law does not violate doctors' First Amendment rights to free speech, writing that the information gleaned from an ultrasound was "pertinent" to a woman's decision-making.

At least four justices must agree to hear a case for it to be taken up by the Supreme Court. Court observers have been closely watching the court, which now includes Republican-confirmed Justices Brett Kavanaugh and Neil Gorsuch, to see whether they'll take up cases challenging Roe v. Wade, the 1973 decision that legalized abortion nationwide. Next year, the justices will hear arguments about a Louisiana law that requires doctors to have admitting privileges at a local hospital.

The law in Kentucky, known as the Ultrasound Informed Consent Act, requires doctors who perform the ultrasound also to describe the images and to play the sound of the heartbeat. It allows women to look away from the ultrasound screen and to ask the doctor to turn off the sounds. Doctors who don't comply can be fined and referred to Kentucky's medical licensing board.

Proponents of the law, signed by Gov. Matt Bevin, a Republican, cite women's right to informed consent about the procedure.

The American Civil Liberties Union challenged the law on behalf of Kentucky's lone abortion clinic, EMW Women's Surgical Center in Louisville. Opponents of ultrasound laws say they get in the way of doctor's free speech protections and that they impose psychological harm on women who have abortions.

The Supreme Court has declined to take up other cases challenging ultrasound laws, and lower courts have struck down ultrasound laws challenged in other states.

La Corte Suprema permite que la ley de ultrasonido del aborto de Kentucky entre en vigencia por Kimberly Leonard

La Corte Suprema no escuchará una apelación sobre una ley de Kentucky que obliga a los proveedores de salud a mostrar a las mujeres embarazadas ecografías de sus fetos antes de abortar.

La decisión, emitida el lunes, significa que la Corte Suprema deja intacta una decisión 2-1 del Sexto Circuito de que la ley no viola los derechos de la Primera Enmienda de los médicos a la libertad de expresión, escribiendo que la información obtenida de un ultrasonido era "pertinente" para la toma de decisiones de una mujer.

Al menos cuatro jueces deben acordar escuchar un caso para que el Tribunal Supremo lo aborde. Los observadores de la corte han estado observando de cerca a la corte, que ahora incluye a los jueces confirmados por los republicanos Brett Kavanaugh y Neil Gorsuch , para ver si se ocuparán de los casos que desafían a Roe v. Wade , la decisión de 1973 que legalizó el aborto en todo el país. El próximo año, los jueces escucharán argumentos sobre una ley de Louisiana que exige que los médicos tengan privilegios de admisión en un hospital local.

La ley de Kentucky, conocida como la Ley de consentimiento informado por ultrasonido, exige que los médicos que realizan el ultrasonido también describan las imágenes y reproduzcan el sonido de los latidos del corazón. Permite a las mujeres apartar la vista de la pantalla de ultrasonido y pedirle al médico que apague los sonidos. Los médicos que no cumplan pueden ser multados y remitidos a la junta de licencias médicas de Kentucky.

Los defensores de la ley, firmados por el gobernador Matt Bevin, un republicano, citan el derecho de las mujeres al consentimiento informado sobre el procedimiento.

La American Civil Liberties Union desafió la ley en nombre de la única clínica de abortos de Kentucky, EMW Women's Surgical Center en Louisville. Los opositores a las leyes de ultrasonido dicen que interfieren con la protección de la libertad de expresión del médico y que imponen daño psicológico a las mujeres que tienen abortos.

La Corte Suprema se ha negado a abordar otros casos que desafían las leyes de ultrasonido, y los tribunales inferiores han revocado las leyes de ultrasonido impugnadas en otros estados.


